- a. City Council receive a report on the Adult Use of Marijuana Act and options available for regulation within City limits; and, give direction to staff regarding possible Ordinance, taxing or other applicable Regulations; and, give direction to staff regarding current prohibition of dispensaries within the City of Marina.

Council Questions: does AUMA supersede Marina's ordinance on outdoor cultivation by patients; if congress votes for funding to enforce the adult use of marijuana how does that impact cities that allow for adult use of marijuana to be in the community, business aspect of it; is the Folsom Ordinance attached as an ideal model or attached for information only, why was this one picked; taxing on acreage or square footage; regulation of licenses on population and population needs, how do you assess population needs; allowable ratio cannabis businesses in census tract; there aren't existing ordinance that regulate cannabis businesses other than cultivation, is that for recreational use; could we put on a non-general election a ballot a general tax measure for medical cannabis; allocation of state tax revenue on cannabis; if city draft ordinance prohibiting recreational marijuana dispensaries and outdoor cultivation and still allow delivery of the same to locations in the city would that be legal to do; if city passes an ordinance like that would it have an effect on medical marijuana; discussion on effects of recreational marijuana dispensaries and cultivation outside has on law enforcement, does it increase a burden substantially.

#### Public Comments

- Mike Owen – Commented on what was stated at the joint council/public works commission meeting last month on the gaps of income available and what was needed for capital improvement project. If we use the maximum income from the business license tax and everything else at the most we would only stabilize the condition of our pavement ratings. Commented on a Bill under consideration called The Cannabis Safe Payment Act, to assist local governments if they choose to participate with the approval of the county board of supervisors and local tax collector so that area dispensaries could have a nearby option for making their tax payments. It's encouraging that the state is doing what they could to benefit from this with tax revenues. The time is right to move forward.
- Michelle Saunders – Support the use of medicinal marijuana and CBD use. Opiates are destroying the bodies organs and addictive. Asked council to not drag their feet on this matter and approve the opening of a medical marijuana dispensary.
- Kevin P. Saunders – Operating Coasterdam since 2010. Recognized the effects of CBD and defied Marina local law but not in defiance of state law. Medical marijuana was legalized in 1997. California spokesman for NO on 64 Campaign and is not for recreational marijuana. \$200,000 is a conservative estimate for revenue as Marina is larger than Del Rey Oaks and adjacent to a growing collage town. Time to legalize medicinal marijuana dispensaries and lift ban and say no to recreational use.
- Seth Smith – VP of Communication and Public Affairs at the Santa Cruz Veterans Alliance (SCVA) a nonprofit medicinal cannabis cultivation organization in Santa Cruz County. We began as a horticultural therapy program started by veterans for veterans. We have over 400 members in Santa Cruz County and hold regular meetings where we donate medicine to our members free of charge. These meetings are attended by approximately 75-150 veterans at a time. About 2 dozen

of the 75-100 veterans that come to our monthly meetings are from Monterey County. Our primary concern the SCVA is to ensure access to quality, lab tested medical cannabis grown by US military veterans for our veteran patients. Announced to make our team available to council and staff while you consider the potential medical cannabis cultivation, manufacturing and dispensaries.

- Richard Carl – Commented that there are a lot of veterans here in Marina that can't drive to Salinas or Del Rey Oaks to receive medical marijuana, they have to ask for rides and have expressed an interest in having a dispensary here in Marina. A lot of people would be very happy if the ban was lifted.
- Rebecca McCallon – Would never put a price on a child's head and hope the city wouldn't either. Are we putting money over our youths and our city? Does this know what the cost is going to be? What do we have to do. Do we know what the actual revenue would be if there are several dispensaries opened? Is it all about money, is this what it's really about? Has the city looked into what the results have been in other cities by opening up dispensaries? It there testing for someone driving under the influence like with alcohol? City should slow down and look into gathering more information. Understands that if you medically need it, it can be delivered to you.
- Kitty Merchant – Medical Marijuana has been legal since 1997 and there is a wealth of knowledge and human resource to be found in it pioneers that must be included in this conversation. There is a need and mandate that law enforcement be at the table as well. Urged clergy and other community foundations to speak up so all opinions are heard and applied. Hopes an ordinance can be read that is merit based and give points and weight to applicants. Coasterdam is a national brand dominate its sector on social media and has pioneered CBD and CBD applications both statewide and locally. Monterey County is the new home to California's flourishing marijuana industry. Let's position Marina now to fully take advantage of this bill.
- Karyn Wolfe – No opinion yet on medical vs. recreational for Marina but wanted to emphasize that this could be a very long and arduous process to work through these issues. Encouraged council to be sparing in overinvesting time and spinning your wheels, be judicious about where we're putting our energy because there is a lot to be found out over the long haul and could dominate a lot of council time; and since the legality of use and cultivation in homes has shifted thinks this a really go time for our law enforcement to be playing close attention to certain vectors of support that we're concerned about during this process.
- Sam Rashkin – The cannabis and social transformation is very interesting. The cannabis business is bringing young people into the process. Hopes that when Marina adopts its regulations they're scalable, allowing small startups as well as larger employers. The cannabis business can be broken down into three (3) basic categories of production, manufacturing and sales. Production is usually growing/agriculture and can be contained and monitored with a good tax base and a good opportunity for educational employment. There's manufacturing which is edibles and concentrates, which have risks. There are sales, delivery services and dispensaries. They are going to be the tip of the iceberg we see but not the basis of the whole business. There is no one-size fits-all policy because each community completely different. Noted that cannabis remains Federally illegal.
- Lana & Bob Blajec – President, Monterey Bay Alternative Medicine in Del Rey Oaks. You're being educated and going through the process of learning what the cannabis industry is all about. This is what it's going to take for everyone to move forward in the right way. Regulation is the most important asset that you can possibly give this city when you are moving forward. If you move backward it's not going to benefit either the community or the patients the understanding of what cannabis brings. Offered to answer any questions, give tours, any other opportunity that can

avail to you to help educate this process. Very interested making sure the veterans are able to get access to medical marijuana not just in Marina but in the state. There are a lot of medical patients here that are not able to travel. If you would have started with a medical facility it would allow you to move forward in a way that is progressive and let you establish what might come when this becomes totally recreational.

Delgado/Brown: to:

- 1) direct staff to communicate with the City of Del Rey Oaks and the City of Salinas representatives and those of any other cities or entities with whom staff thinks that appropriate to communicate in order to understand who those cities or entities have been affected both financially and in public safety regards by their cannabis businesses as well as how they plan to modify their ordinances to be consistent with Prop 64 and the use of marijuana act; and
- 2) that we proceed with the Planning Commission in the direction of considering ordinance language for the following three matters:
  - a. to consider allowing 1 or 2 Retail or other number as planning commission recommends cannabis dispensaries; and 1 or 2 indoor commercial cultivation businesses
  - b. to allow like that of the City of Del Rey Oaks a tax on medical cannabis businesses; and
  - c. to allow but regulate outdoor cultivation with consideration of up to a total of six (6) plants as allowed by adult use of marijuana act and consider limiting such growth to residential backyards that are fenced and secured and to regulate indoor growth such that the total indoor and outdoor plants per household not exceed 6 plants
- 3) that staff shall provide an update to city council every 2 months on the progress of this matter

Mayor modified motion to allow 1 or 2 Medical Retail Cannabis Dispensaries and 1 or 2 indoor Cultivation Commercial Cannabis businesses and to add #4 to have Planning Commission look at zoning requirements and removing the educations portion from #1 relating to Prop 64

- Karyn Wolfe – might be helpful to look at the statistics of the number of homeless women that are in Monterey County based on the biennial census and then look at the numbers that we’re providing housing for compared to the overall population of the County.

Council Member Amadeo - Received numerous calls from property owners in Marina who own homes that had property managers managing them who were licensed in the City of Marina but they were being told by Muniservices that they also needed a business license in order to rent their home. Concerned that when we switch over they would be dealing with the same issue. HdL would be contacting homeowners, feels homeowners would be taxed twice. How we tax entities needs to be looked at so that when this new company is doing the business license notifications and collecting on those that should be licensed and are not that they’re actually going after businesses that need to be licensed as opposed to this double taxation.
